Salutations from the Social Worker

Have you ever wondered to yourself "How old should my child be before I can leave him or her home alone?" This is a question that we probably have all thought about at one time or another.

Below are a few questions to ask yourself before leaving your child home alone:

- Does your child understand and follow rules?
- Can your child understand and follow a safety plan?
- Does your child make good judgment calls or does he/she take risks?
- Does your child know basic first-aid?
- Does your child follow directions about staying away from strangers?
- How does your child handle situations, which are unexpected, do they stay calm or get easily upset?

Before you leave your child home alone take a practice run. Leave for a 30-minute time frame where you can get home quickly if your child needs help. You will also want to set some ground rules. Talk with your child about how to handle the following situations; having friends, TV time, computer or Internet use, answering the phone, and getting along with siblings.

Below are the guidelines that Wright County Human Services follows. If children are left alone for more than what is stated below, Wright County considers this to be a failure to provide necessary supervision or childcare arrangements.

- Children age 7 and under who are left alone for any period of time
- Children ages 8 - 10 who are left alone for more than three hours

- Children ages 11 - 13 who are left alone for more than 12 hours
- Children ages 14 - 15 who are left alone for more than 24 hours
- Children ages 16 - 17 may be left alone for over 24 hours with a plan in place concerning how to respond to an emergency.
- Children under age 11 should NOT provide child care
- Children ages 11 - 15 who are placed in a child care role are subject to the same time restrictions of being left alone as are listed above
- Children ages 16 - 17 may be left alone for more than 24 hours with adequate adult back up supervision

Remember, as parents, you know your child the best. There is no hard and fast rule as every child is different, but if you plan on leaving your child home alone following some of the ideas listed above will probably make both you and your child less anxious about the situation.

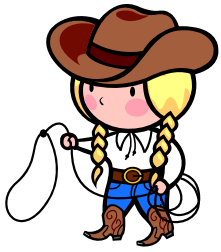

Is Your Child Getting Enough Sleep?

Healthy child development requires sufficient sleep. Sleep is something our bodies need to do. We know that during sleep many of our body's major organ and regulatory systems remain actively functioning, and the body produces more of certain hormones.

Sleep deprivation doesn't just make children sleepy and tired the next morning. Lack of adequate sleep has been linked to problems such as hyperactivity, learning difficulties, weight gain, illness, mistakes and accidents, behavior problems and higher levels of depression, hopelessness and low self-esteem.

To prevent problems like these, there are a few techniques that parents can do. Ensure that children know that tonight, tomorrow night, and the night after that, bedtime is always the same, even on weekends.

1. Set a regular time for bed and stick to it.
2. Establish a relaxing bedtime routine, such as reading stories, singing or giving your child a warm bath.
3. Make after-dinner playtime a winding down time. Too much activity close to bedtime can keep children awake.
4. Avoid feeding children big meals close to bedtime.
5. Avoid giving children anything with caffeine less than 6 hours before bedtime.
6. Set the bedroom temperature so that's comfortable - not too warm or too cold.
7. Make sure the bedroom is dark. Use a small nightlight if necessary.

Keep the noise level low.
